# BUNTS SANGHA'S S M SHETTY HIGH SCHOOL & JUNIOR COLLEGE ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE ACADEMIC YEAR 2024 - 2025

Bunts Sangha's S M Shetty High School & Junior College sets the foundation of a student's ultimate intellectual, conceptual and emotional growth. Institution's driving spirit is a testament to our belief of how knowledge aids our students is the architects of our future. Apart from preparing the children to qualify for purely academic demands, special efforts are being made continuously to enable them to face the challenges of the competitive world. In the current academic year we have a total strength of 2162 students. With overall 29 qualified full-time teaching staff and 3 visiting faculties, who work in collaboration with the non-teaching staff to achieve the vision and mission of the institution.

## ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENTS (2023-24)

The HSC Board examination results show the academic progress of the Junior College students. In the year 2023-24 total number of students who appeared for the exam, in the Commerce stream were 622, in Science stream were 461 and in Arts were 53. We have achieved 99.5% results in both Commerce and Science. Whereas in Arts we have achieved a 100% result. Our students have brought glory to the institution and we congratulate all the academic achievers.

## UPDATING THE DESIRED COMPETENCIES OF TEACHERS:

## ***LEARNING FOR JOY, NOT JUST FOR JOBS***

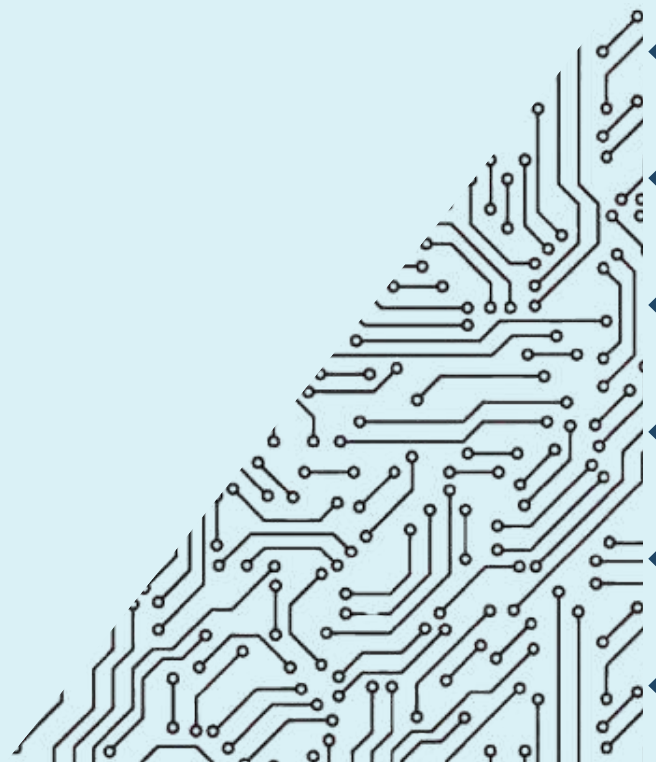


As we are leaning towards adulthood, the conversation regarding higher education is surrounded by the question "Will this get me a good job?" "Will I earn a lot of money?", although it's important and natural to worry about such things, it often overshadows the purpose of education, Joy of learning. Education is often seen as a means to an end, where knowledge is valued only as a tool to secure a stable career and a good salary. But is this the only reason we pursue higher education? Shouldn't education be about more than just credentials? Wasn't education about education and development? Consider the difference between studying and learning. Studying is often about memorizing facts, pulling all-nighters while preparing for exams, and focusing on external validation. Learning, on the other hand, is about the joy of discovering new ideas, understanding complex concepts, and developing a lifelong curiosity about the world around us. Studying for the sake of learning should be an experience of personal enrichment, where the focus is on growth, exploration, and intellectual fulfillment, rather than just the outcome of grades and qualifications. Focusing on the subjects that you are interested in, instead of forcing yourself into taking subjects that you don't find any passion in, often leads to better mental health, as stated in a study published in the journal *Social Psychology and Personality Science* by Vallerand et al. (2003) distinguish between two types of passion: harmonious passion and obsessive passion. People who pursue careers based on their passions in a harmonious way tend to have better mental health and life satisfaction, while obsessive passion (often driven by external rewards or financial concerns) can lead to burnout and dissatisfaction. In the context of education, this could suggest that students who follow their passions tend to have more positive long-term outcomes.

The reality is that we live in a world where both knowledge and credentials matter. While learning for its own sake is essential, we also need to understand that, in the practical world, our qualifications and degrees play a significant role. The key is to find a balance between the two truths. We can pursue our passions and curiosity while also working towards practical goals and career aspirations. Perhaps it's time to redefine what it means to be "successful" in education. Success doesn't have to mean passing exams and obtaining a degree, it can mean becoming a more curious, critical, and creative person. Every subject we study has the potential to enrich our lives, to deepen our understanding of the world, and to make us more thoughtful, empathetic, and aware. Whether we're studying history, science, or art, the key is to appreciate the process of learning, not just the outcome. Education isn't about acquiring intellectual growth, knowing your interests and passion and learning to compromise to forge a path to achieve what you desire, because although degrees and other qualifications are important, they should never overshadow the true importance of learning. Therefore, a "useless degree" doesn't exist if it brings you fulfillment, broadens your perspective and feeds your curiosity. The true purpose of education is not a mere piece of paper, but developing our character and having a life-long love of constantly learning something new.

## किशोरों की सामायोजन समस्याएँ



बच्चों के विकास में परिवार का महत्वपूर्ण स्थान होता है। बच्चों का व्यक्तित्व एवं समग्र जीवन परिवार के वातावरण से प्रभावित होता है। परिवार न केवल बच्चों के शारीरिक एवं मानसिक विकास में सहयोग करता है अपितु उसके भावी व्यवहार एवं जीवन शैली को भी निश्चित दिशा देता है क्योंकि माता-पिता एवं बच्चों के मध्य अंतरंगता के फलस्वरूप ही उनके व्यक्तित्व का निर्माण होता है। अतः परिवार में अभिभावकों व बच्चों के बीच मधुर संबंधों का वातावरण अत्यंत आवश्यक है।

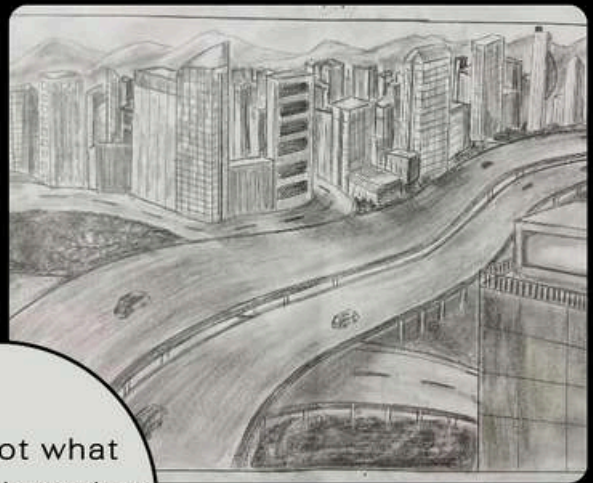
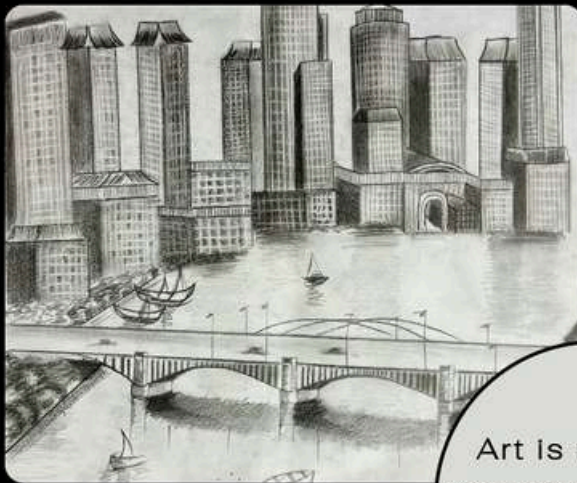
आज बच्चों व किशोरों में गंभीर मानसिक और भावनात्मक कमियाँ पनप रही हैं। इनमें से एक समस्या बच्चों में सामायोजन क्षमता का अभाव भी है। किशोरों से जुड़ी ऐसी समस्याओं का समाधान के दिशा में शोधकर्ताओं ने प्रयास किए हैं। ऐसी ही एक शोध अध्ययन रिपोर्ट का उल्लेख किया जा सकता है जिसमें प्रति बच्चन द्वारा 13 से 16 वर्ष के 150 किशोरों को एक प्रश्नावली दी गई। अध्ययन के परिणाम स्वरूप यह देखा गया कि सामायोजन एवं सुरक्षा की दृष्टि से जिन परिवारों में बच्चे पारिवारिक स्नेह, सौहाद्र, आत्मीयता एवं सकारात्मक वातावरण प्राप्त हुआ है। निश्चित रूप से उन विद्यार्थियों में सामायोजन सुरक्षा एवं एकता की भावना पाई गई जिनके परिवारों में विघटन गतिविधियाँ एवं कलहपूर्ण वातावरण था।

अध्ययन में यह देखा गया कि पारिवारिक अस्वीकरण अर्थात् अभिभावकों द्वारा बच्चों के तिरस्कार अथवा उपेक्षा से बच्चों में आक्रामकता, कुसमायोजन, समाजविरोधी व्यवहार और क्रोध, ईर्ष्या तथा विषाद उत्पन्न होता है। परिवार में बच्चों का समान स्तर से ही हो सकता है तभी वे अपने विकास में रुचि लेन, सकते हैं। इसके लिए समय न होना। भाई-बहनों में सामंजस्य न होना; तुलनात्मक आलोचना करना व उपहास स्वरूप कहना, उन्हें अधिक नियंत्रण देना व हँसी उड़ाना, बच्चों को हमेशा दूसरों से तुलना करना, उन्हें आत्मीय समझना और पालन-पोषण एवं बच्चों के व्यवहार पर धैर्य न देना आदि। उपरोक्त सभी लक्षण पारिवारिक अस्वीकरण के अंतर्गत आते हैं जिन परिवारों में इन लक्षणों से युक्त वातावरण बच्चों को मिलता है वह बच्चे अन्य की तुलना में मानसिक एवं भावनात्मक रूप से ज्यादा अक्षम सिद्ध होते हैं।

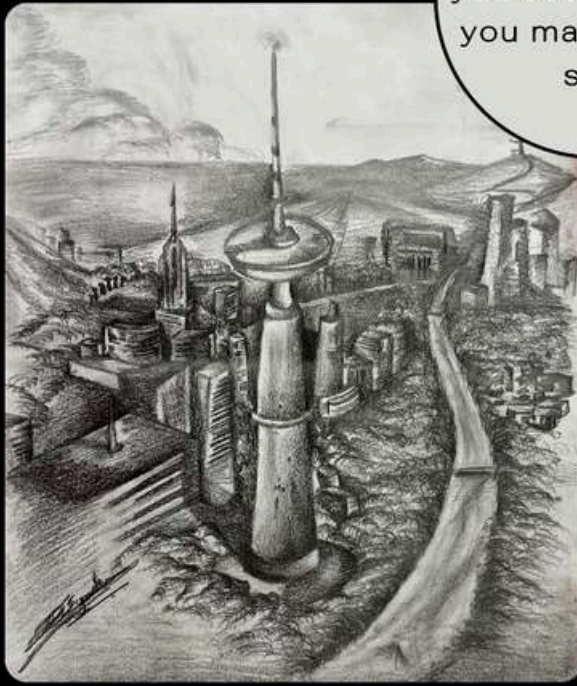
इस शोध अध्ययन के अनुसार उक्त समस्या का समाधान पारिवारिक समाकरण में ही निहित है यदि बच्चों को कुसमायोजन आत्मग्लानि एवं आंतरिक दुर्बलता से बचाना है तो उनके लिए पारिवारिक समाकरण का वातावरण अत्यावश्यक है। स्वीकार के वातावरण में माता-पिता का बच्चों के प्रति स्नेह एवं उनकी गतिविधियों में रुचि लेना एवं उनके व्यक्तित्व को समझते हुए उनके मनोबल को प्रोत्साहित करना अति आवश्यक है। बच्चों की बातों को ध्यान रखना, उनकी उपेक्षा पूर्ण मानसिकता को न अपनाना, उनको पूरा सुरक्षा देना व उनकी आवश्यकताओं को समझना, बच्चों की विभिन्न समस्याओं को जानना व उनके प्रति स्नेहपूर्ण व्यवहार करना पारिवारिक समाकरण के अंतर्गत आता है। अतः परिवार ही बच्चों का प्रथम विद्यालय है जहाँ से उनके व्यक्तित्व का निर्माण होता है और उनके अंदर छिपी सारी क्षमताओं को विकसित करने के लिए उन्हें मार्गदर्शन एवं प्रेरणा देनी चाहिए ताकि वे अपने जीवन की सभी समस्याओं का समाधान उचित मानसिक दृष्टिकोण से करने में सक्षम हो सकें एवं उन पर विश्वास कर सकें।

# THE ROAD NOT TAKEN


*“Two roads diverged in a yellow wood,
